2025: Year at a Glance

Excelencia led through a pivotal moment in higher education in 2025, responding to and strategizing with institutions navigating a rapidly changing national landscape. Together with our community of practice, we stayed the course to continue shaping a future of accountability and opportunity within higher education to provide value for every student and ensure America's future.

Our accomplishments include:



Centering post-traditional student and institutional leadership voices in new research and recommendations that address financial aid and college affordability.

Our analysis informs policy and compels action that supports access to a quality education and economic mobility for the majority of students in college today, whom Latinos represent.



Elevating evidence-based practices increasing student success, exemplified by the 2025 Examples of *Excelencia*,

in addition to engaging over 250 college and community-based programs in our community of practice to foster connections and learning that grow what works to facilitate access to excellence.



Expanding the national *Excelencia in Action (E-Action)* network — uniting more than 200 college and university leaders and deepening our collaboration with them to transform higher education and tap the talents of the Latino community amongst all. The E-Action network represented 6% of all institutions, yet enrolled and graduated over one-third of Latino, and nearly one-fifth of all, students.



Supporting Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) amid the current administration's elimination of their federal funding by organizing leading HSIs to make the case for investment in capacity building and demonstrate their value to all of their students and communities.



Strengthening our affiliates' internal systems to intentionally serve Latino, and all, students and external proof of positive impact with tailored capacity building support. We met nearly 50 institutions where they were on their journeys of transformation to more intentionally serve Latino, and all, students with clear, actionable steps for continuous improvement.



Certifying and recertifying 18 colleges and universities with the Seal of *Excelencia*, a national certification that holds institutions accountable for demonstrating continuous improvement and positive impact on student outcomes. Nationwide, 48 Seal-certified institutions have met this standard of excellence, and they produce outsized impact in terms of enrolling and graduating students.



Excelencia's Portfolio

DATA AND RESEARCH

Latinos represent a post-traditional student majority, often navigating multiple paths through higher education while balancing work, family, and other responsibilities. *Excelencia* focuses on piloted efforts that work for Latino students because they can also work for others.

As the trusted source of information on Latino and other post-traditional students in higher education, *Excelencia* establishes a foundation of knowledge on issues influencing student success to catalyze institutions, advance effective policies, and compel action.

Research:

Excelencia in Education’s research addresses contemporary issues in higher education — issues like college affordability and pathways to the workforce — using a Latino lens to educate decision makers, drive more effective policymaking, and inform institutional transformation to better serve students.

Excelencia released more than **15 new research publications** in 2025 to inform and compel action that centers on the experiences and realities of students in college today. Additionally, *Excelencia* answered close to **60 requests from stakeholders** to advance student success strategies.

EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICES

By identifying and promoting evidence-based programs at the forefront of improving higher educational achievement, *Excelsencia* supports institutional and community leaders, practitioners, funders, and policymakers to take an asset-based approach to serving Latino, and all, students. The institutions and community-based organizations implementing these programs produce positive outcomes for their communities by creating opportunities for students and families and facilitating pathways to student success.



[Examples of Excelsencia](#) is the only national, data-driven effort to recognize programs with evidence of effectiveness in increasing Latino student success amongst all served.

Over 20 years of Examples, Excelsencia has:



Reviewed **thousands** of program submissions;



Recognized **more than 400** programs for their impact; and



Raised and awarded **more than \$2.2 million** to programs making a positive difference for students across the country.

In 2025, *Excelencia* recognized **30 programs** for evidence-based practices facilitating access to excellence for all students. Among them, **four programs** were selected as the **2025 Examples of Excelencia** for building faculty pipelines, providing holistic support, connecting classroom learning to in-demand jobs, and offering research and mentorship experiences that foster persistence, completion, and career success.

2025 Examples of Excelencia

General Motors Automotive Service Education Program (GM ASEP), Cerritos College – Norwalk, CA (Associate Level): The program ensures that students remain enrolled, succeed academically, and graduate with the skills and certifications needed to enter high-demand careers. In 2023-2024, 78% of GM ASEP students earned a degree on time — 79% of whom identified as Latino — compared to 11% of non-participating students at Cerritos College graduating on time.

ÁNDALE Latino Research Training Program, California State University, Long Beach – Long Beach, CA (Baccalaureate Level): ÁNDALE helps increase the number of qualified, first-generation, educated graduates in the fields of nutrition and health science. In the 2023-24 academic year, ÁNDALE engaged 53 undergraduate students, surpassing its goal of 50 students, with a 100% retention rate.

Crossing Latinidades Humanities Research Initiative, University of Illinois Chicago – Chicago, IL (Graduate Level):

The program intentionally supports Latino graduate students in navigating critical stages, equipping them to advance through dissertation milestones and access opportunities that position them for academic and professional success. Of the 27 Latino fellows in the 2022-23 cohort, 100% achieved ABD status and advanced to candidacy.

Community of Practice for What Works:

Excelencia's Community of Practice for What Works is a cadre of programs recognized through Examples. *Excelencia* continues to engage, convene, and promote the work of these program leaders after they are recognized. More than 120 programs are part of this community, and *Excelencia* curates and shares their models with funders, policymakers, institutional leaders, and others interested in growing what works for Latino, and all, students.

Excelencia collaborated with and facilitated support for over **270 programs** to strengthen evidence-based practices increasing student success nationwide.

LEADERSHIP

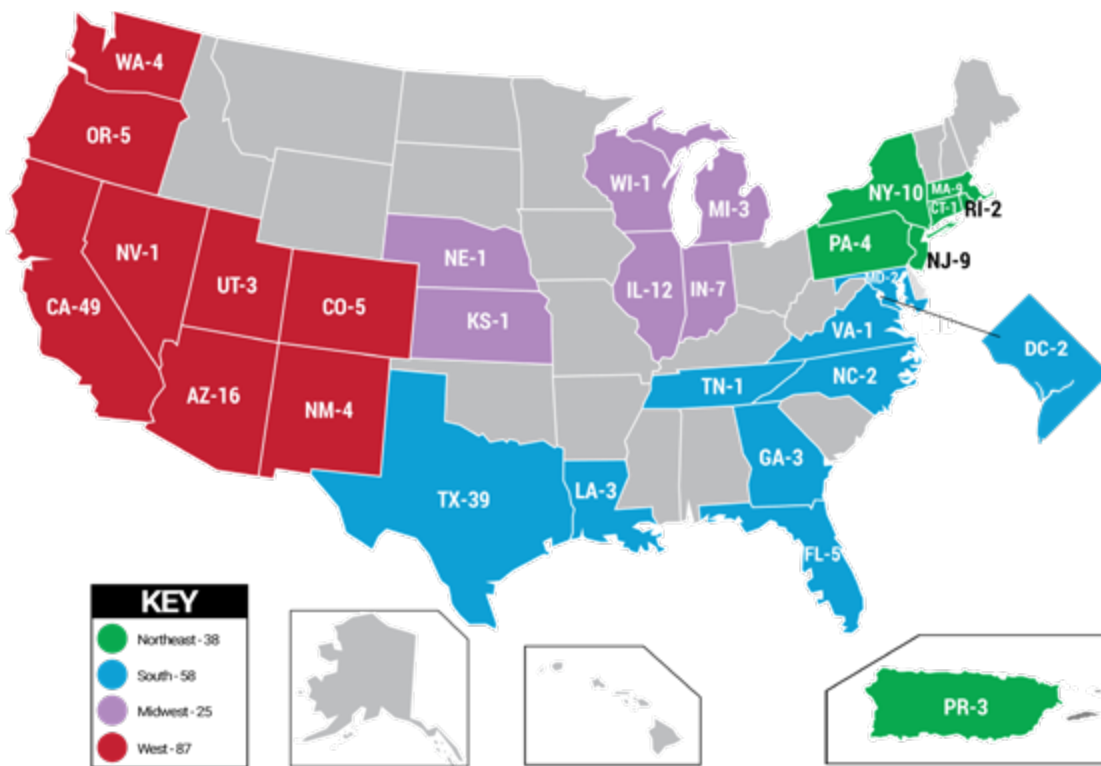
Leadership is the hallmark of how *Excelencia* and our community of practice expand opportunity in higher education. In a year of change, *Excelencia* expanded our network and strengthened our connections with college and university leaders, working with them to set the agenda for student success.

Excelencia in Action (E-Action) Network:

Excelencia leads the national [Excelencia in Action \(E-Action\)](#) network of presidents, chancellors, and program leaders committed to ensuring Latino, and all, students earn an education of value. Institutions affiliate with the E-Action network voluntarily, united by a commitment to transforming into learning environments where students thrive. Through E-Action, they partner with *Excelencia* and each other to become more student-centered and data-informed.

The commitment of this small group of colleges and universities manifests in results. E-Action institutions graduate a higher proportion of Latino, and all, students than they enroll — demonstrating the kind of efficiency that grows talent for our nation’s workforce.

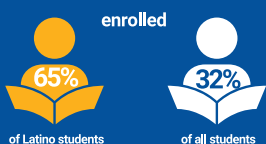

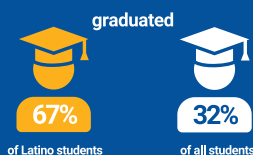

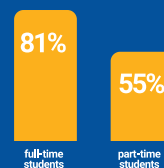

Supporting Hispanic-Serving Institutions:

When the current administration eliminated \$229 million in funding for Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) in September, *Excelencia* mobilized the HSI community.

We issued a national [call to action](#) for constituents to support HSIs and [asserted that HSI funding represents a strategic investment](#) in America's competitiveness, democracy, and shared prosperity. We published our [annual HSI analysis](#), covering 30 years of their critical role in providing access to a quality education for all students. And we engaged directly with HSI leaders, documenting their stories and equipping them to communicate their institutions' impact in the national context.

The challenges facing HSIs are happening on our watch. *Excelencia* continues to make the case for HSIs and their federal funding.



Policy Fellows:

The *Excelencia* Policy Fellows program identifies higher education leaders from Seal of *Excelencia* certified institutions who have already demonstrated a powerful commitment to student success, and puts them on a path to serve on the frontline of transformation. They engage in programming that deepens their understanding of federal higher education policy and national strategy, strengthening institutional impact and building a strong community of practice.

Policy Fellows amplify the already strong impact of *Excelencia* and our network and activate new levels of leadership at campuses nationwide. For example, in the three years since the program began, a former Policy Fellow has become the president of an institution.

CAPACITY BUILDING

When colleges and universities transform to serve Latinos well, they increase their capacity to serve all well and ensure higher education remains a powerful engine of social mobility, workforce development, economic vitality, and knowledge creation. Institutions nationwide continued to demonstrate this truth by progressing their own transformation journeys despite an uncertain climate — and they partnered with *Excelencia* to keep building momentum.

Capacity-Building Programming:

As the public increasingly demands a clear return on investment from higher education, *Excelencia* offers capacity building programming that equips colleges and universities to demonstrate continuous improvement and measurable student outcomes that bridge internal growth with external proof of value and resonate with funders, policymakers, and other stakeholders.

Our capacity building programming involves more than reports and one-time consultations. It takes the form of sustained, year-long engagement with interactive sessions featuring curated content from subject matter specialists, policymakers, researchers, and higher education leaders — all fostering asset-based discussions on data, evidence-based practices, and leadership with a student-centered lens.

Through capacity building, *Excelencia* enhances a purposeful connection between institutions, providing them space to build communities of practice and share experiences. As their trusted partner in change, we ensure the time and effort institutional teams invest in these opportunities yields tactical action plans and lasting transformation — helping them meet the moment and progress their journeys to intentionally serve students.



Institutions participated in two kinds of capacity building opportunities in 2025:

- **Capacity Building Institutes** – Cohort-driven learning opportunities for institutions to develop and share strategies, build *comunidad* with peers, and refine their use and alignment of data, evidence-based practices, and leadership to intentionally serve Latino, and all, students.
- **Seal Serving Institutions Transformation Assessment (SSITA)** – A self-assessment tool aligned with the Seal of *Excelencia* framework for institutions to examine who they are serving, not serving, and intend to serve — the starting point for intentional alignment of data, practice, and leadership to ensure Latino, and all, students thrive.

▶ **47** institutions participated in Institutes.

▶ **30** institutions used SSITA to measure their capacity to intentionally serve students.

The Journey to Intentionally Serve Latino, and All, Students:

Every institution's transformation journey is rooted in its unique context. With this understanding, *Excelencia* leverages more than 20 years of experience listening to, learning from, and working with colleges and universities to meet institutions where they are on their journeys with tailored capacity building support and clear, actionable steps for continuous improvement in student success.

We have charted a path of capacity building opportunities to help institutions build sustainable, campus-wide habits of continuous improvement informed by a simple principle — that delivering meaningful results for Latino, and all, students, their communities, and our country requires institutions to hold themselves accountable for ongoing self-reflection, effort, and innovation.

SEAL OF EXCELENCIA

The Seal of *Excelencia* puts into action our belief that higher education institutions' intentional, mission-driven investment in serving Latino students ensures all of our students, communities, and country are served. It is where the elements of *Excelencia's* portfolio — data, evidence-based practices, leadership, and capacity building — come together.

2025 Seal of *Excelencia* Certified Institutions:

Excelencia established the Seal as a national certification to hold colleges and universities accountable for continuous improvement in student outcomes. Institutions earn this standard of excellence through an intentional alignment of data, evidence-based practices, and leadership — all resulting in student success.

The 18 institutions that earned the Seal of *Excelencia* began their journeys with *Excelencia's* robust tools to assess readiness and build capacity. They chose to publicly demonstrate their positive impact on Latinos amongst all despite headwinds in the national higher education environment, joining a community of 48 trendsetting colleges and universities spanning three progressive levels of certification.



Seal of *Excelencia* Certified Institutions:

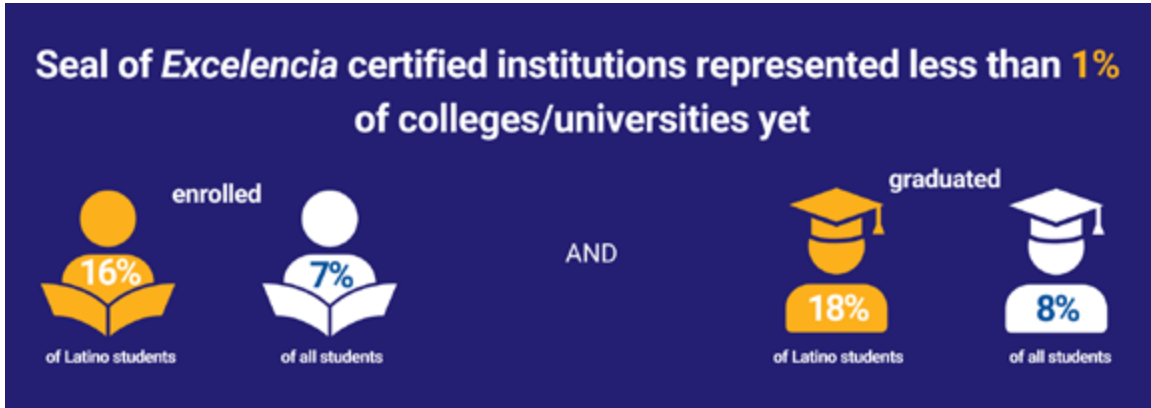

- **The Seal-certified institutions were located in 11 states.** Of Latino students, Seal-certified institutions enrolled:

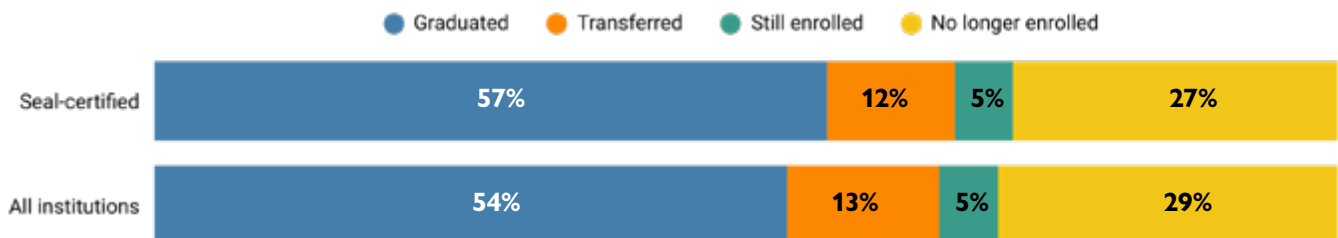


- **Latino faculty representation was over two times higher than at all institutions.**



- **Latinos’ degree outcomes were better than at all institutions.** Latinos at Seal-certified institutions had higher graduation rates (57%) than Latinos nationally (54%), and were less likely to no longer be enrolled (27% vs. 29%).

Degree Outcomes of Latino Students 2023-24



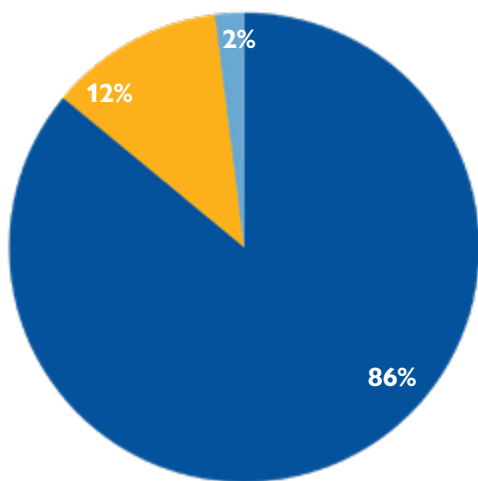
