

Prior to joining Ford, he worked at MillerCoors, Molson Coors and Coors Brewing Company, where he managed multicultural relations, corporate social responsibility and marketing programs. He was instrumental in building the global procurement strategy during the Molson Coors merger.

She previously held the positions of vice provost for academic affairs and vice provost for academic planning and accountability at FIU. As FIU's first vice provost for academic planning and accountability, she established institutional assessment and evaluation plans as well as policies that currently serve the university's practice of striving for continuous improvement and developing a culture of evidencebased decision-making.







Margarita Benitez is executive director of the Puerto Rico Humanities Foundation in San Juan, Puerto Rico. She brings to her current role a lifelong commitment to higher education that began at the University of Puerto Rico. During her time in Washington, D.C., she held various senior positions at the Office of Postsecondary Education in the U.S. Department of Education and worked in pivotal areas impacting Latino student success. Achievements include directing the launch of GEAR UP and the Title V Institutional Development for Hispanic-Serving Institutions programs, and heading the Upward Bound, Talent Search and Educational Opportunity programs in TRIO.

Estela Bensimon is a professor of higher education at the Rossier School of Education at the University of Southern California and founder and director of the Center for Urban Education. Since its founding in 1999, CUE has helped thousands of college professionals—from presidents to faculty to academic counselors—take steps in their daily work to reverse the impact of the historical and structural disadvantages that prevent many students of color from excelling in higher education. And with a singular focus on increasing racial equity in higher education outcomes for students of color, she developed the Equity Scorecard, a process for using inquiry to drive changes in institutional practice and culture.

Jesse M. Bernal is the second vice president for inclusion and equity at Grand Valley State University in Allendale, Michigan. He joined Grand Valley in 2015 and oversees the university's coordinated efforts to advance diversity and campus climate. Prior to arriving at Grand Valley, he served as a senior diversity officer at Santa Clara University and the University of California Office of the President as well as in other academic and student affairs roles in the UC system.



Sarita E. Brown is co-founder and president of *Excelencia* in Education, a not-for-profit organization based in the nation's capital with the mission to accelerate Latino success in higher education. Starting her career by building a nationally recognized program to increase Black and Latino talent earning graduate degrees at the University of Texas at Austin, she came to Washington, DC in 1993. Since then, she has held positions at prominent national educational institutions, not-for-profit organizations and at the highest levels of government working to implement effective strategies to raise academic achievement and opportunity for low-income and underserved students.



Beatriz Ceja is director of the Hispanic-Serving Institutions Division in the Office of Post-Secondary Education in the U.S. Department of Education. She previously served as a program manager for the Teacher Quality Programs in the Office of Innovation and Improvement. As a program manager, she oversaw the administration of several discretionary programs, including Race to the Top District, Teacher Quality Partnership, School Leadership, Supporting Effective Educators and the Transition to Teaching.



Nichole Davari is the program director of Latino Achievers of the YMCA of Middle Tennessee in Nashville, Tennessee.



Erika de la Riva is a community-engaged researcher who serves as the assistant director of research and planning at Richard J. Daley College in Chicago, Illinois. Her chief responsibilities focus on providing research and analytical support to assess institutional effectiveness; providing leadership to the development of college-wide strategies; and spearheading grant-writing efforts to secure funding for new college initiatives. She previously served as a research project manager at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine. She has worked for several community organizations and managed projects in parental involvement and community health education and served as co-investigator on community-engaged research projects.



Virginia M. Fraire is the associate provost at the University of Texas at El Paso. Prior to this role, she served in multiple leadership capacities at Austin Community College District in Austin, Texas, including vice president of student affairs. Here, she led 30-plus student and academic support units across 11 campuses to improve student access and graduation. She is the architect of ACC's nationally recognized advising program where she worked with student and academic affairs to establish a more holistic and integrated advising approach. Through her leadership, the college established robust transfer services and pathways working with multiple colleges and universities.



Ronald Gray is vice president for student affairs and dean of students at Felician University in Rutherford, New Jersey. He also serves as the chief student affairs officer. He applies his unique experiences to heighten the attraction and retention of students at Felician University. Prior to coming to Felician, he worked at various colleges and universities, serving students from diverse backgrounds and communities. Through collaboration, a shared understanding, common purpose and collective action, he has worked with university and community members with a commitment to diversity as a critical asset in the quality of teaching and learning, inquiry and innovation.

In this role, he advises the congresswoman, who is vice chair of the Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies Subcommittee on Appropriations, on education policy. Prior to working for Congresswoman Roybal-Allard, he worked for U.S. Rep. Raúl Grijalv (AZ-03) as a Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute Public Policy Fellow.



Eyra Perez is the technical assistance coordinator for *Excelencia* in Education. In this role, she advances the non-profit's strategy and provides support for institutions committed to intentionally serving Latino students. She brings more than 25 years of experience in Latino student access and success, Hispanic-Serving Institutions, equity-centered practices, program development and management, student development, student leadership, financial aid, transfer, STEM, and parent involvement. Her professional experience includes higher education, K-12 education, and non-profit community-based organizations.



Monte Perez is president of Los Angeles Mission College, which serves Los Angeles San Fernando Valley and is one of nine colleges of the Los Angeles Community College District. Prior to this position, he was president of the Moreno Valley College. He also served as vice president of student services at Golden West Community College in Huntington Beach, California, and as provost and vice president of academic affairs at the National Hispanic University in San Jose, California. Here, he engineered the successful WASC accreditation for NHU as the first Latino non-profit independent senior college on the West Coast.

Belle Wheelan is president of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. She is the first African American and the first woman to serve in this capacity. During her 30-year career, she has served in many roles including as a faculty member, chief student services officer, campus provost, college president, the state of Virginia's secretary of education and president of an accrediting association. She has received numerous awards and recognition including four honorary degrees and Washingtonian Magazine's 100 Most Powerful Women in Washington, D.C. She currently serves as Vice Chair of the Board of Directors for *Excelencia* in Education.
